1. By Gender

- 3. By ability (most important)
 - 10-15% performance guideline
 - Pre-competition (entry) scores
 - Preliminary (on-site) performance
 - Observed games and individual skill tests
 - Minimum 3; maximum 8 per division

Event: Shot Put

Division 1 (Age Group: 16-21)

Athlete ID#	Age	Distance
010	16	10.0m
252	17	9.8m
490	16	9.8m
115	18	9.5m
620	21	9.5m
331	19	9.3m
915	18	9.1m
807	20	9.0m

Note: All athletes are within the designated age group's range of ages and their distances are within 10% of the best score.



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Criteria for Athlete Advancement

- Winner of each division has equal chance to advance to the next level of competition
- Athletes should be chosen by random draw

Promote the participation of persons with disabilities in mainstream sporting activities at all levels.




What does the reality of inclusion of people with (intellectual) disabilities in mainstream sport look like?




The segregation model = most common

Disability Sport





Special Olympics Unified Sports = full integration




People with & without intellectual disability playing sports together

Unified Sports players without intellectual disability are called partners.


The keys to a meaningful involvement of all players in a team are age and ability matching.

- 10% of overall athlete population




Tasks for Special Olympics


