Historical tradition

The forming of associations have a long and strong tradition in Denmark

The right to form associations is embodied in the Danish constitution (1849)



It is said that whenever three people get together to share a common interest, they immediately form an association!



Three national organisations

Three national sport organisations in Denmark:

The Danish Sports Confederation and Olympic Committee (DIF)

- 1.6 mio members
- 10.600 clubs

Danish Gymnastics and Sports Associations (DGI)

- 1.3 mio members
- 5.000 clubs

The Danish Federation of Company Sports (DFIF)

- 330.000 members
- 92 company clubs




DGI – regional organization

Facilities

The number of sports facilities in Denmark per inhabitant is among the highest in Europe

- 1.200 sports halls
- 300 swimming baths
- 5.300 football grounds
- 2.000 tennis courts
- 2.500 gyms




Most of the sports halls were built in the 1960-70ies – now they need renovation




Level of activity in Denmark











Democracy in the clubs

Democracy in the clubs

The clubs are;

- non-political
- non-religious
- non-profitable



A club is governed by a set of norms, rules and regulations

- to ensure the democracy in the club
- to describe elections
- to describe membership

The board of the club

- A board is elected every year
- any member over 18 years can be elected
- members of the board is not paid for the job





Social responsibility

The clubs play an important role in society

- Teaches members the rules of democracy
- Ensure healthy members
- Supports the integration of foreign citizens





Volenteering work

Coaches and instructors

- are doing volunteering work (is not paid)
- are offered education
 - technical, tactical and planning the activity
 - first aid
 - fundraising
 - Knowledge about children

Volunteering work helps a lot of coaches and instructors when they look for a job.
